In focus: Old war planes given graffiti makeover

The disused aircraft were painted by more than 30 artists inspired by the plane graffiti and 'nose art' that became popular during WWII.

Five American military airplanes were recovered for the project from "bone yards" -- aircraft scrap yards found in deserts across the US.

The "Boneyard Project" also features a selection of nose cones given the full creative treatment.

Artist Andrew Schoultz covered a Lockheed Jetstar spy plane in red, white, and blue ink for his striking mural.

Other stunning pieces include a Super DC-3 decked out in vibrant colours and another was made to look like an eagle fling through the air.

The creations are currently on display at Pima Air and Space Museum, in Tucson, Arizona.
